Pathways and Pitfalls to Growth

First United Methodist Church can build a new future by intentionally creating new ministries that focus on serving the needs of people who live in center city Marion, the surrounding neighborhoods, and suburbs. To do that we get to open dialogue with people who live nearby and throughout the community to learn their views on how the church can serve them.

A pathway to innovation will be involving neighbors and community influencers who are not currently engaged with First United Methodist Church in developing new practical services for all ages.



We have been discussing the need for change and growth among ourselves for two years. Now is the time to reach out and listen to people in the community for their ideas of ways to use the building to meet their real needs that aren't already being served.

By involving others, together we can envision a new robust future of effective service and meaningful growth.

A pathway to change will come from honest dialogue and brave visioning. We can build a new and different future. We have already begun.

The fundamental pathway to growth is following the radical Jesus in his example of active love for all people.

Published research supports our intuition and experience with both growth and decline. We are aware of "pitfalls" – blocks that prevent growth.

The first pitfall to growth is the comfort zone where people become comfortable doing what they are familiar with, and therefore, resist change. There is tremendous resistance to change in our society and our church.



Research indicates that eighty percent of the population finds reasons not to change even if change would be positive and beneficial. Our preference for the comfortable and the familiar keeps us stagnant, like sitting in a canoe at the bottom of a mountain,

getting nowhere, solving nothing, burnt out by boredom.

The second pitfall that holds people back is learned helplessness. This is where people feel they just can't do it. The feeling isn't true, it's just emotional blockage, and it keeps people and organizations from moving forward and from innovation and growth.

The third pitfall is the path of least resistance, which is always looking for an easy way to achieve a result. But nothing worthwhile can be achieved easily, so nothing worthwhile is accomplished. Mediocrity becomes good enough.

At the August, 2021 Council Meeting, Steve Sharon presented a report on the book, "Anatomy of a Revived Church," by Thom Rainer. Steve summarized three main points; that 1) churches must change or die, 2) churches must serve outwardly rather than focus inwardly, and 3) there is no such thing as a "silver bullet," or single heroic solution. Rather, it will require all of us working together in the pathways while rejecting the pitfalls that prevent growth.

The process of change is a profound adventure and sober responsibility. Staying the same means we repeat, repeat, repeat; while watching society pass us by.

We have the moral responsibility to find people half our age and engage them in leadership so they can attract and minister to their peers.

Our new robust future depends on involving new young people and their families in casting a new vision and building new ministries.

We've already begun to change in small ways. It is time to accept the always-present-opportunity to build new. Together, we can hear the voices of young people around us and respond to their concerns which we expect to be different than ours at our stage in life.

To leave this 191-year-old congregation alive and growing for the next generations, we will accept the challenge of real change. There is no greater blessing than to steward

resources to engage and support those who will follow us.

Let's avoid the pitfalls and look outward and ahead to find effective pathways to growth.



Do You Know Your ABCDs?



On Saturday, June 3rd, Debbie Ivey, Kraig Piper, Wes Rediger, and Sarah Evans attended a Sacred Places training in South Bend at Olivet AME Church. This program was centered on Asset **Based Community** Development (ABCD). As we continue the process of thinking about how to best use our building for ministry and mission, it's important that we


focus on the assets - the strengths and resources that we have at hand or that we can develop.

We began with a simple exercise, asking us as individuals to identify our "Gifts of the Head, the Hands, the Heart".

- Gifts of the Head are things we know, something we could teach to others.
- Gifts of the Hands are things we can do, things we can make or create.
- A Gift of the Heart is something we care deeply about, a passion that motivates us.


As we looked at each others' "gifts," we began to see overlaps and similarities – things that we all found in ourselves and now, in each other.

Next, we were asked to do a similar exercise, not looking at ourselves, but instead looking at our congregation. We were



asked to consider the types of "assets" our church has. We were asked to consider associations, institutions, the economy, stories, and the physical resources that we have available to us. When we laid those next to the individual gifts that we had already posted, it was exciting to see what were possibilities for ministry in our building and in our neighborhood. And that was only with four of our congregation sharing their ideas! Imagine what we might come up with if all of us at First Church started considering our assets.

How we think about our future as a church will lead to our success or failure to be disciples of Jesus. If we think all of the time about scarcity (Fig 11A), it will lead to more scarcity and finally to failure to be faithful to the Gospel.



If we think about abundance (Fig 11B)— if we focus instead on our assets and work at cultivating the strengths we have, we have a much greater opportunity to reach out to people who need us and who want to be a part of something that matters.

The leader on June 3rd said throughout the session that we have to PRACTICE thinking about possibilities, we have to PRACTICE being positive, we have to PRACTICE believing that we can be a force for change here in Marion, Indiana, we have to PRACTICE looking for our assets. We have to harness the collective power of our congregation.

To begin this process, we will ask everyone to join us on Sunday, July 9th for worship and a brunch following to begin our journey in discovering our assets – to discover our passion, what motivates us – as individuals and as the body of Christ.

Please plan on joining us as we listen to one another and think about what could be!


