I remember Sidenia Stace as my English teacher when I was a young teenager and how she made the subject fun. I remember how David Byrum taught me to be sensitive of other people's needs. I remember Betsy Doepken and Carolyn Ellis as parental figures as well as senior high Sunday school teachers.

These people, along with many others, have left lasting impressions on me. Outside of Martha Dougherty, who sadly passed some time ago, I still have communication with these fine people to this day. Dee Aguilar may have moved to Indianapolis, but she made it to my brother's funeral two years ago and that helped me with another difficult time in my life. Barb Salveter continues to give her time and service to the church but she no longer has the VW and probably does not chauffer rowdy preteens anymore.

Sidenia Stace volunteers for so many things here at the church. A few years back, she invited me to be part of the

church council with a voice message on my phone that started "this is your favorite English teacher." I keep contact with David Byrum, Betsy Doepken and Carolyn Ellis through Facebook. I was fortunate to be present at a retirement celebration for Dave a couple years ago. I had a really good visit with Carolyn before she relocated to Kentucky. Betsy recently moved to Michigan and I really hope our paths cross in



the near future. And, Mrs. Dougherty, I can still hear you counting along while the hymns are being played during Sunday services. Thank you all so much for the time you have given me. My education, my growth and my memories are all because of the nurturing you gave.


#### Front Cover Photo


### Rummage Sale

The Marie Webster Quilt Guild utilized our facilities for their annual Quilt Celebration, July 20th through the 22nd. The event, which started on Thursday and extended through Saturday evening, was filled with classes on Featherweight sewing machines, Show and Tells from renowned quilters and classes on various techniques. One such class held in our parlor was Pat Christ's Stumpwork embroidery workshop. Pat Christ, nationally recognized quilt historian, along with her husband Arlan are pattern designers and authors focusing on the Pennsylvania German people. The Pennsylvania Germans were frugal but creative. Stumpwork is a technique they developed to use even the smallest of fabric scraps. This type of wool embroidery was generally done on closely woven fabrics that were being recycled from worn clothes or household items. Leftover yarn from other projects was used with a tin star pattern that was made by the local tinsmith. There was never any waste in the household of a Pennsylvania German.

During the event, our sanctuary was filled with masterful examples from talented quilters in Grant county and surrounding areas. See page 3 for more photos of this wonderful event.
